By the time you read this message spring will be here and we should be enjoying warm and sunny weather. It's a great time of year to play ball or take a walk on one of our trails or along one of our

If you've walked along our streams and in some of our parks in recent years, you may have

noticed areas where we are working to eradicate invasive weeds, most notably Japanese knotweed. Although Japanese knotweed is not directly "dangerous" to people, it can be incredibly damaging to the environment. It can grow upwards of 10-feet tall and spread rapidly through a continuously growing underground horizontal root system. Japanese knotweed is so vigorous that it can dominate the natural landscape and result in a drastic reduction of native plants, trees and shrubs. It is particularly problematic along waterways, as large areas of the streambank can be exposed when the stems die back in

Controlling Japanese knotweed takes at least two seasons and consists of a cutting with a follow up of herbicide. Late season application of herbicide in the control phase is especially effective because this is when the foliage is sending sugars produced through photosynthesis to the roots and rhizomes; systemic herbicides move through the plant with those sugars. After initial control efforts have nearly eliminated the knotweed, it will be important to monitor the site and treat any new growth to prevent reinfestation. Selective use of herbicides to control invasive plant species is recommended by Penn State Extension, Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program, and other reputable sources.

To help us continue this important work, the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources awarded Haverford Township a \$50,000 grant from the Community Conservation Partnerships Program.

This funding will assist us in removing invasive weeds and restoring approximately 5 acres of riparian forested buffers on well-trafficked Haverford Township property along Darby Creek and Cobbs Creek.

The Township's multi-year plan includes the planting of 750 mixed hardwood trees and shrubs, along with 300 "Live Stakes." Live Staking reintroduces plant life directly in the places that need it most, the stream banks. Stem cuttings taken from certain trees during their dormant season (before the buds break in the

spring) are inserted directly into stream banks. These cuttings, referred to as "live stakes," will eventually grow into new trees and are an effective way to establish a root network in the stream banks and help prevent further soil loss.

Every year, we rely on volunteers to help with our parks and trails. This will be especially important because, as part of our grant application, we estimated a successful project to include more than 1,300 volunteer hours over the next several years. We have already had a number of dedicated volunteers, but we can always use more help. This work requires minimal equipment and zero knowledge. 

PHISHING EMAILS



Phishing emails look like they come from a legitimate source. However, when you examine the sender's email address, it is not the correct email address of the sender. Instead, the emails are sent from criminals trying to obtain information or infect your computer with a virus. Phishing can come from any source, including banks, etc. There have been reports of phishing emails that appear to originate from Haverford Township, but do not. If something doesn't look right, the email address doesn't match, or you aren't expecting an email from that person – be safe and do not open the email.

OUR LIBRARY'S WIDE IMPACT



Of the thousands of programs the Haverford Township Free Library (HTFL) offers each year, library staff does not usually expect the type of impact that one program had for a patron in October of 2019. HTFL hosted the program, which now seems eerily prophetic: "The Influenza Pandemic of 1918-1919 in Philadelphia" presented by Dr. Robert Hicks, former Director of the Mütter Museum. In the crowd that attended the program was Nancy Bader Thomas, a longtime user of the Library. At the end of the program, Ms. Thomas spoke to Dr. Hicks about her father's work during the Flu Epidemic – a collector, by horse and wagon, of those who died of the flu in Philadelphia. By October 1918, the city was in the grips of a deadly surge of Influenza cases brought on by thousands of people attending a war bond parade down Broad Street in late September.

Dr. Hicks was really interested in Ms. Thomas' father's work and connected her with New York Times writers Dan Barry and Caitlin Dickerson who included her father's story in an article that appeared on the front page of the newspaper on April 5, 2020, entitled: "The Killer Flu of 1918: A Philadelphia Story."

2022 BUDGET INFO

t the December 13, 2021 public meeting, the Board of Commissioners passed the 2022 Operating and Capital Budgets. Acknowledging that many of our property owners are still feeling the negative economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic along with those owners who felt a sizeable financial impact from the 2021 county reassessment project, the Board held the line for the 2nd year in a row regarding any tax rate increases! The annual trash/recycling fee increased to \$275 per year to account for increased tipping fees from Delaware County Solid Waste Authority. We hope to have real dialogue in 2022 about ways to reduce township-wide residential consumption on which those tipping fees are paid. The \$47.3M general fund budget provides funding to continue our full slate of municipal services including operational administration, police/fire protection, emergency medical services, road maintenance, recreational programs and maintenance to over 30 township parks! The \$34.9M capital fund budget includes several continuing projects such as the Pennsy Trail development, solar panel installation, continuation of the trail system along Darby Creek, funding for historic properties, and new fire apparatus. The 2022 budget also includes \$5.2M in American Rescue Plan Act spending which will be largely focused on park improvements, stormwater sewer replacement projects and enhancements to the business districts.

CELEBRATE ARBOR DAY BY PLANTING A TREE

A rbor Day annually falls on the last Friday in April, this year it is on April 29th. Arbor Day was first observed in 1872 in Nebraska and is now observed throughout the nation and the world, with millions of trees being planted annually.

Haverford Township follows the standards set by the Arbor Day Foundation for their Tree City USA program. It provides the framework for a healthy, sustainable urban forestry program in our township. The Shade Tree Commission follows these standards to ensure that our public trees benefit our community in many ways:

Reduce costs for energy, stormwater management, and erosion control.

Trees clean the air, absorbing pollutants that trigger asthma attacks and other health problems, as well as absorbing carbon dioxide and providing life-giving oxygen.

Stormwater runoff can be reduced by tree canopies by as much as 65 percent, reducing flooding and the

erosion of topsoil.

A tree planted today on the west side of a house can reduce energy bills by 3 percent in only five years and

by 12 percent annually in 15 years.

Trees boost property values across our community. Real estate professionals report that houses with adjoining healthy trees and pleasant landscaping can contribute as much as 20 percent to the property value.

LEARNING HOW TO RECYCLE

averford Township is now participating in the TerraCycle program. TerraCycle offers free recycling funded by brands, manufacturers and retailers around the world to help collect and recycle hard-to-recycle waste.

The Township went with two collection bins that are clearly labeled and located to left side of the main

entrance of the Township building (1014 Darby Rd). One bin is for oral care which includes hard to recycle items like tooth brushes, toothpaste, packaging and also floss containers. The other bin is for your personal care items like lip balm tubes, soap dispensers and many different types of cosmetic cases.

When dropping off items to recycle, try and clean out as much unused product as possible. If you bring your items in a container or a bag, please just empty the recyclables into the appropriate bin. Please no razor blades or electric/battery operated tooth brushes as these items are not accepted at this location.



COMMISSIONERS APPROVE ADDITIONS

HISTORIC RESOURCES OVERLAY

cting on the recommendations of the Historical Commission, in September 2021 the Board of Commissioners added three properties—an historic home, a civic site, and a "Sears" kit house—to the Township's Historic Resources Zoning Overlay. These are the first properties added since 2013. The Garrigues house on Buck Lane is significant for Samuel Garrigues who, with his son Haydock, were important Township leaders during the 19th century. Samuel deeded the house to his daughters in 1851. It was named Maywood in 1896, and the Tenney family occupied it for over 80 years. The house and carriage barn are classic examples of turn-of-the-century eclectic architecture. American Legion Post #338 was established in 1919 and is important as one of the earliest posts in the nation. The 1924 post building on Grasslyn Avenue represents a century of recognition and support for U.S. military veterans. In the early 20th century, Sears, Roebuck & Co catalogs offered house kits for purchase by mail, with a choice of over 300 models. The purchaser received all materials and assembly instructions. The well-preserved 1919 "Elsmore" Sears house on Turnbull Avenue is the fifth Sears' model listed on the historic resources overlay. fifth Sears' model listed on the historic resources overlay.

HOARDING AND FIRE SAFETY

People with hoarding disorder have an excessive attachment to their belongings, even seemingly worthless or unusable ones. They feel comforted buying and accumulating things, but greatly distressed if they ever try to discard them. This can lead to a cluttered, unsanitary, unsafe living environment, and take a heavy toll on their close relationships, especially with family and friends who struggle to help them.

Hoarding disorder is most commonly diagnosed in older adults with a family history of hoarding. Some display symptoms following a stressful or traumatic life event, such as a divorce, accident, or the death of someone close. Others find that hearding accommonics and heavy toll made the death of someone close.

someone close. Others find that hoarding accompanies another mental health problems like depression, PTSD,

or ADHD to name a few.

Hoarding can cause risks to both the occupants of the home as well as to first responders. If personal items crowd cooking equipment, it can make it unsafe to cook. Crowded heating equipment can cause fires. Stacks of items can become unsteady and fall onto occupants of the home or even first responders trapping them. If an emergency does occur, blocked windows and doors can cause major delays in getting critical care to a patient or being able to do a search and rescue for a trapped person during a fire.

If you are looking to help a friend, a family member or someone from your community here are four things you

should know:

• The individual is likely to show resistance to letting others into their homes

• The individual may be dealing with more than just hoarding

Hoarding is not the same as collecting

• The individual has developed an emotional attachment with their belongings Fortunately, with the right treatment, there is a positive outlook for hoarding. If you are looking to help an individual struggling with hoarding, it is best if you turn to a mental health professional.

Paring for a loved one at home? Interested in training that will lead directly to employment in caregiving services? The Surrey Academy offers customized instruction and training designed to meet the needs of both types of caregivers at no cost to participants, thanks to a generous grant from Haverford Township and the Bennett Family Foundation.

For aspiring professionals, the Surrey Academy provides in-person and remote classes with direct hands-on skills development, complemented by "internships" with experienced caregivers who will mentor new caregivers. Following successful completion of the program, participants will be certified as direct care workers and will be eligible for employment with Surrey or elsewhere. Family caregivers will receive flexible instruction accompanied by one-on-one training with a nurse professional in their home or at the Surrey Academy Skills Lab. This unique program is designed to help family caregivers feel more confident caring for an older adult at home.

The Surrey Academy is a new initiative of Surrey Sérvices for Seniors, a provider of programs,

services, and home care to older adults from its Senior Center in Havertown. Spaces are available for new candidates.

Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also creates health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance companies in order to properly protect their personal residence probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have.

Article I, Section 149-3, subsection C (2) Sewer Service Regulations of the Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Please pay particular attention to the following coverages: Coverage for Sewers, Drains and Sump Pumps:

This valuable coverage is not included under your standard homeowner's policy but can be purchased by endorsement for an additional premium.

Flood Coverage:

Flood coverage. Flood coverage is not included under your homeowner's policy. However, flood insurance is available under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and can be obtained through your insurance agent or broker.

The Township does not provide flood insurance.



Cooler temperatures. Cleaner air. Higher property values. Healthier residents. The benefits of trees are seemingly endless — and by earning Tree City USA recognition for 18 years, we experience these benefits firsthand. The Township's recognition as a Tree City USA is thanks, in large part, to volunteers serving on the Haverford Township Shade Tree Commission and other organizations within the Township.

The Shade Tree Commission is an advisory board empowered to make recommendations and provide advice to Township officials concerning shade trees. Each year the Shade Tree Commission conducts two shade tree giveaways, one in the spring and one in the fall. For further information about upcoming events, residents should watch our website, email communications and social media.

Late last year, the Board of Commissioners updated our regulations regarding Public Shade Trees. A Public Shade Tree is any tree in a public park, property, street or highway, or the part of any tree extending into those areas.

A permit is required to plant, prune, remove or spray a Public Shade Tree. Landowners of trees on private property must keep such trees trimmed so that the minimum clearance of any branches overhanging sidewalks and streets is 12-feet and 14-feet, respectively. No permit is necessary for this normal maintenance. Likewise, no permit is needed to trim or prune shrubs and bushes within the public area.

SENIOR CORNER

hat is Alzheimer's Dementia? Americans are living longer than in previous generations. For persons born in 1920, just over 100 years ago, the average life expectancy was approximately 53 years. For those born in 2020 the predicted average life expectancy was about 79 years. This data emphasizes that we are living significantly longer these days. Unfortunately, just like wrinkles on our skin, and changes in our vision, the thinking processes of our brains may be affected by the aging process, and by poor lifestyle choices. There have been an abundance of articles telling us how to keep our brains young, like getting adequate sleep, eating a healthy plant-based diet, getting exercise, and controlling stress through techniques like meditation. But what exactly are we dealing with when we talk about Alzheimer's?

The scientific term dementia is not a single disease, but a group of symptoms with a number of causes that interfere with daily living. Those symptoms include marked memory loss, problem-solving difficulties, daily confusion, inability to complete routine, daily tasks, and changes in mood and personality. Often the mood and personality changes occur first. It is important to know that we are not talking about occasional forgetfulness or disorganization, but problems that occur on a daily basis, making it difficult to function.

The most common subtype of dementia is Alzheimer's. There are changes that occur in the brain at the level that takes a microscope to see them, and that lead to these problems. While some people with Alzheimer's inherit the tendency to get this age-related disease, the majority of individuals with Alzheimer's do not have a genetic history in the family.

There are presently medications and behavioral modifications that can be used to help Alzheimer's patients in the early to moderate stages of the disease, but at this time there is no cure, and it is progressive.

The good news in all of this is that the vast minority of people 65 and older in the U.S. will not experience dementia. In 2014, the number of citizens over the age of 65 was approximately 47 million, and the number of older individuals affected by dementia was about 5 million, so just a little over 10%. As one gets older the risks increase, but again the majority of individuals over 80 do not experience dementia, with sources saying approximately 20-25 % experience some level of dementia: mild, moderate, or severe. Obviously 75-80 % do not have this cluster of symptoms. Should you suspect you or a family member have these problems, it is advisable to contact your primary care physician.

REMINDERS ON BRUSH COLLECTION

he Township is happy to offer curbside brush collection every Monday. This proactive service keeps brush out of the trash stream (saving on disposal costs) and is re-purposed as mulch by the brush site at no cost to the Township! However if we don't separate it correctly, both the Township and environment lose all of the benefits. When doing yard work, please remember the following:

- The brush site can accept only untreated wood products such as sticks, branches, brush, and wood chips
- Branches and brush must not be more than 1 1/2 inches in diameter and must be less than 3 feet long --- Please **DO NOT** tie materials
- All yard waste must be in cans or containers that can be easily lifted (less than 40lbs)
- Bags of any kind CANNOT be collected (including biodegradable)
- Please do not contaminate brush with any of the following: dirt, soil, leaves, grass clippings, kitty litter, pet manure or trash of any kind
- Brush must be at your collection point by 6:30am every Monday morning

SHADE TREE LOTTERY UPDATE

Very year, the Haverford Township Shade Tree Commission helps township residents recceive free trees because when you plant a tree, you make our environment healthier and our streets more welcoming. The benefits of trees are enormous: they provide cooling shade, manage stormwater, soak up carbon dioxide, improve property values and provide shelter for birds and small wildlife.

This past April 30th, the Haverford Township Shade Tree Commission held its 3rd annual Tree Lottery for township residents. We had 98 shade and flowering trees for distribution via a random drawing for those residents who submitted an entry form online. 229 residents participated in the random drawing.

On pick-up day, 80 residents arrived to collect their trees but the remaining 18 did not. We were able to find homes for the unclaimed trees, including placing several in the Haverford Reserve but it was a frustrating scramble at the last minute. It is also discouraging for those who did not win a tree and might have picked one up otherwise.

We plan to hold a Fall 2022 Tree Lottery. The Tree Lottery is only open to Haverford Township residents with the intention that the trees planted will increase the canopy in our neighborhoods.

You will find more information on the Township web page and social media sites. We ask that you be considerate of your fellow neighbors and enter only if you are committed to planting and caring for the tree on your property, and are available to pick up your tree on the designated Saturday. Many thanks to those who have received and planted trees over the years.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

uring the month of October, fire companies across the nation join together to get the message out about fire prevention & safety. This started back in 1925, when President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week should be a national observance where children, adults and teachers can learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. During the week of Oct 9th, many firefighters will go out in their local communities and provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires.

So why the week of Oct 9th you may ask? Fire Prevention week is observed each year during this specific week to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. You may be familiar with that children's song, "Old Mother O'Leary" and her famous cow. Well, rumor had it that Old Mother O'Leary left a lantern in her shed and the cow kicked it over.....and that is how the Great Chicago fire started. Now Old Mother O'Leary denies this to be the case and the true cause of the fire was never determined. The fire burned wildly throughout the following day, finally coming under control on Oct 10th, when rain gave a needed boost to the firefighting efforts. In the end, 100,000 people were left homeless. More than 17,000 structures were destroyed and damages were estimated at \$200 million.

Now today, the Chicago Fire Department training academy is located on the site of the O'Leary property where the Great Chicago Fire started. In 1997, the Chicago City council passed a resolution exonerating Catherine O'Leary and her cow.



COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Comprehensive Plan: A "vision board" for the future of Haverford Township.

Much like a personal vision board, a municipal Comprehensive Plan identifies goals for future growth and development, outlines challenges facing the community, identifies potential solutions, and provides guidance on future community planning-related decisions.

Our township is substantially developed, and the public input that we've received (by way of questionnaires, surveys, public workshops and public meetings) found that many residents do not want to see any changes to their neighborhoods. Therefore, the Plan recommends to preserve our residential areas, and emphasizes a few areas in the township that are most subject to change.

These recommendations include the revitalization of older business areas (such as Haverford Road and Eagle Road), protecting important natural features, promoting environmental sustainability, preserving important historic buildings, and becoming more bicycle-friendly and walkable. No condemnation is proposed.

When completed, this document is intended to help guide future regulations. Adoption of the Plan does not result in any changes to the Zoning Map, Zoning Ordinance, and/or Land Development Ordinance. Any proposed amendments will be subject to a similar process including public meetings before the Planning Commission, public hearings before the Board of Commissioners, and eventual public vote for adoption by the Board of Commissioners.

The Planning Commission has finalized their recommendations regarding the Comprehensive Plan and has forward their comments to the Board of Commissioners. The Board of Commissioners will hold a Public Hearing and accept public comment prior to consideration. The date of the hearing has not been determined at the time of this writing, however, we anticipate the matter will be heard in January 2023.

• Make sure your vehicle is fully stocked with windshield wiper fluid with de-icer. Check regularly—this fluid can be depleted significantly by even one snowstorm.

• Make sure your defrosters and windshield wipers work and replace the blades if they have become worn.

When shoveling and plowing snow from your sidewalks and driveways, do not put the snow in the street. Placing snow in the street delays the clearing of the streets and is also a violation of

township ordinance.

Always remember to lock your car doors at night and call 911 immediately to report suspicious activity.

HISTORIC PLAQUE PROGRAM

omething that many of us appreciate about Haverford Township is the strong sense of place in our neighborhoods. A big contributor to this feeling is the character of our built environment, which traces the historical development of our township. Preserving this history and character was the primary goal in 1997 when the Haverford Board of Commissioners approved a survey of historic township properties that should be preserved, and passed the first preservation ordinance. The Commissioners revised the preservation ordinance in 2009, and created the Haverford Township Historical Commission. In addition to reviewing proposed exterior alterations to historic properties that were identified in the 1997 Historic Resources Survey, the Commission actively promotes recognizing and preserving the historic character of our neighborhoods. To make our historic properties more visible, the Historical Commission has been working on a new Historic Plaque Program, similar to programs in historic communities around us. Property owners will be able to purchase and display specially-designed bronze metal plaques on their building to identify its historic importance. The program was researched and developed over the past year and will be presented to the Board of Commissioners for review soon. We look forward to the debut of these plaques!

HOW TO BE STORMWATER SMART



Winter snow often puts a pristine white coat over every surface that makes for beautiful photos and lots of family fun. However, just like when rain falls the rest of the year, melting snow turns into stormwater runoff.

It is not long after the sun comes out and starts melting the snow, that concerns emerge. Even a small amount can cause localized flooding on your property, when it builds up over several small storm events without melting in between. When it finally does melt, runoff can lead to potential community wide flooding events. In both cases, standing and flowing water on the ground picks up all kinds of debris, pollutants, and litter that will find its way into nearby streams.

When shoveling/plowing snow this season, pay attention to where you place it:



- Pile snow in locations with the most opportunity to infiltrate into the ground.
- Pile snow in areas where water does not pond.
- Clear away any snow that may have been thrown onto the storm drains.
- Clear your downspouts to allow melting roof snow to flow and not collect at your foundation.

Pay special attention to places that are eroding during snow melt. Make a plan to improve these areas in spring, using plants that can slow and stop erosion, such as native grasses and meadow plants or native trees and shrubs.



- Do not pile snow on top of storm drains or near water bodies and wetlands.
- Do not pile snow onto rain gardens or bio retention areas.
- Do not overuse de-icing chemicals and salts and avoid spreading around sensitive areas like waterways.

Also remember - more salt does not equal more melting snow. Follow product instructions when spreading deicing material and give it time to work. Sweep up any material remaining after the snow/ice melts to help reduce pollution.

Flood Coverage:

Flood coverage is not included under your homeowner's policy. However, flood insurance is available under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and can be obtained through your insurance agent or broker.

The Township does not provide flood insurance.



SOLAR INFO

f you pay ~\$100/mo. for electricity, that's \$30,000 over 25 **⊥** years! Instead, you can install solar on a sunny roof now, break even in about 8 years, and have about \$20,000 extra in your pocket by year 25 – a great return on investment. Home installations are typically \$15,000-\$25,000 depending on size and are eligible for a 30% tax credit, increased by the Inflation Reduction Act. Loans and no-money-down leasing options are available but take longer to pay back. It is best to avoid telemarketers and deal with local contractors or get unbiased information from local volunteers to help you assess your home and connect you with vetted installers with fixed lower pricing. The best time to install solar is when you have a new roof, but these systems last about 30 years and can be installed on roofs with 20 years of life remaining. Little or no maintenance is required on residential solar systems. The new Inflation Reduction Act also provides 30% tax credits for energy efficient heat pumps, air conditioners, water heaters, etc. as well as up to \$7,500 for electric vehicles.
